Course Objectives

This is a common-core course designed to help students develop their academic English skills. In addition to refining their reading, listening, speaking and writing skills, students will be introduced to new academic strategies that will help them in their departmental studies. Students will learn how to summarize, paraphrase and cite sources.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students will be able to:

- identify the main topic and related ideas in an academic text.
- identify examples supporting an argument in an academic text.
- distinguish between main ideas and supporting details in a presentation or lecture.
- justify and sustain views clearly by providing relevant explanations and arguments.
- summarize information from an academic text.
- support a line of argument in an academic text using direct and indirect quotes.
- write an academic essay in response to a specific question.

Requirements

- Students should actively participate in classes as ENG 101 classes are not in long lecture formats.

Ground Rules:

- Students are expected to produce **authentic work that is not plagiarized, nor written by someone else. Plagiarism** is intentionally or unintentionally using another person's ideas, research and any kind of work as your own, without properly citing the source. This person can be a well-known author, a fellow student or even a blog writer. Use of even one sentence, key phrase, image, or photo without citation is considered plagiarism. While the above mentioned are examples of direct plagiarism, paraphrasing a source without mentioning the author and the source are examples of indirect plagiarism which is subject to the same regulations.
- If students are not sure how to properly cite sources, they should consult their instructor or the writing center.
- Within this course, students are welcome to use AI programs to help generate ideas and brainstorm. However, students should note that these programs still have a tendency to make up incorrect facts and fake citations. There might be situations where students could be asked to use AI tools to explore how they can be used. Yet, use of AI to generate content is **not** allowed in any exams and in-class writing assignments namely *graded outline* and *graded pie/meal paragraph*. Students should note that use of AI constitutes an academic honesty violation and the institution's policy for plagiarism will be followed in those instances.
- Students are required to follow the TEDU Honor Code. **Punishment for plagiarism can range from grade reduction to six months suspension.** All students are expected

to know TEDU principles of academic integrity which can be found at:

Essay Submission Rules

The essay must be submitted in APA style (7th ed.). If you are not familiar with APA style, scan the QR code. In-text citations need to be in APA style.



Late Submission

Students are expected to submit their assignments on time. If students submit assignments late, 10% of the grade will be deducted for each day (for maximum 3 days). After three days no submissions can be made. Students are responsible for submitting their assignments even if they are absent.

Class Readings Please read the assigned readings prior to class so that you may participate fully in the discussion. All readings may not necessarily be discussed directly in class, but it is assumed that you will have read the materials so that it may serve as a jumping off point for discussion.
